Q&A with Dr. Heimlich: A Look Back, Part 2

Hero Happenings editor, Terri Huntington, offers Part 2 of Q&A reflections from Dr. Henry Heimlich, inventor of the Heimlich Maneuver®.

Terri: So what are some of your life's most satisfying moments?

Dr. Heimlich: I was a doctor in the US Navy during World War II. Eventually, I ended up in the Gobi Desert of Inner Mongolia in very hazardous duty. I treated both military and civilians who were injured. Four weeks after the war ended, we were still there.

Suddenly, a man who had been shot in the chest was brought in. I tried to patch up the hole in his chest, but he quickly died. I was a young doctor, and he was the first patient who had ever died in my hands. I often thought of him.

In 1962 I was one of the early chest surgeons. After every chest surgery, we inserted a tube into the chest. It was connected to a suction machine on the wall. The tube removed air and liquid/blood from the chest, so the lungs could expand. For 13 days the tube remained inserted; the patient couldn't get out of bed. One day, as I drove away from the hospital I thought, "Why does the patient have to go through all this? What about a valve that allows fluid and air to pass out of the chest and prevents them from getting back in?"

A patient came in a few weeks later with a collapsed lung. With his permission, I inserted a tube—with a valve—into his chest. I stayed with him all day and night; his lung came up and stayed up beautifully. I took it to Becton-Dickinson, a major medical device manufacturer. They immediately accepted it. And, they are still making it today. At last count we had sold well over 4 million Heimlich Chest Drain Valves. Surgeons today use it in every chest operation.

In 1966, I presented on this valve at an AMA (American Medical Association) meeting in New York. Afterward four Navy officers, who were doctors from Navy Medical research, came over to me. They arranged to take thousands of Heimlich Chest Drain Valves to Vietnam. Every soldier on military duty carried a chest drain valve in a sterile envelope. If his buddy were shot in the chest, they'd insert this tube with a Heimlich valve attached into the bullet hole. By the end of the war, this device had saved more than 20,000 soldiers.

So, I feel as if the man in China, who was shot in the chest and died, did not die in vain.



Everyday Heroes: In Their Own Words

"It all seemed like a slow-motion movie."

Mom: My daughters Mariana and Gabriela were just 11 and 9 years old, respectively, when it happened. My husband, daughters and I were at a funeral reception in our church. Gabi (Gabriela) was drinking lemonade with ice cubes. We were in the middle of a long table; my husband and I were sitting in front of Mariana and Gabi.

Suddenly, Gabi started moving, trying to say something and pointing at her throat. In a matter of seconds her face turned purple—she was choking! Mariana, sitting next to her, immediately stood up and performed the Heimlich Maneuver[®] on Gabi. She pressed her fist in the middle of Gabi's abdomen, as she had learned in our American Heritage Girls' Heimlich Heroes[™] training class. She was very fast. As soon as she saw Gabi's purple face, Mariana's response was immediate.

My husband ran around the table to help Gabi, but she had already expelled the ice cube thanks to Mariana's prompt reaction. I was shocked, and tried to reach her from my side of the table. It all seemed like a slow-motion movie...

Gabi: It was just so unexpected! I really didn't have time to think. I tried to say 'I'm choking', but by that time everybody had already figured out what was happening.

Mariana: Her face was purple and she looked frightened. I immediately got up and, without thinking, did the Heimlich Maneuver on her. It was all so fast, and I was panicked! The ice cube came out, and then she started crying.

Gabi: If Mariana hadn't saved me, I could have died. It can happen so suddenly: one minute you're eating and drinking, and the next you're in a life or death situation.

Mom: We were so proud of Mariana, because she acted so quickly. We are thankful she learned the Heimlich Maneuver, not long before this event happened! Thank you Heimlich Heroes for providing all the materials necessary to teach this important survival technique to our kids and us.

Back to School Health and Safety Reminders

Like Hank and Heidi, kids have headed back to school. Although we're focused on Heimlich Heroes $^{\text{TM}}$ training, we also care about all aspects of health and safety training. Here are a few reminders that may help lighten the back-to-school load:

The First Days are the Hardest

Many students are uneasy about the first days and months of school—at any age. Teachers know students are nervous. They'll make every effort to ensure everyone feels comfortable.



Backpack Safety

Pack light. Organize the backpack to use all compartments. Pack heavier items closest to the center of the back. The backpack should never weigh more than 10 to 20 percent of your child's body weight.

Traveling to and from School

School Bus. Make sure your child walks where she can see the bus driver (which means the driver will be able to see her, too).

Walking to School. Make sure your child's walk to school is a safe route with well-trained adult crossing guards at every intersection.

Bike. Always wear a bicycle helmet, no matter how short or long the ride.
